

Stamp Camp USA was first introduced in 1995 in Tioga County, Pennsylvania, in the Northern Tioga School District area. The program encouraged young "campers" to combine their artistic and creative talents with organized philately, stamp exhibiting, and open exhibit competition.

Stamp Camp USA conducted the first four years from 1995-1999 in Knoxville, Pennsylvania. As interest increased and the program developed, with the assistance of the United States Postal Service and the American Philatelic Society, CEO and founder Cheryl Edgcomb was detailed from her postmaster position to postal headquarters in Washington, DC to pilot Stamp Camp USA on a national level.

In 2003, Stamp Camp USA became incorporated in Pennsylvania, and by 2005, it achieved IRS designation as a non-profit 501(c)3 educational organization.



Today, Stamp Camp USA operates as a non-profit entity that relies upon strong community and individual collaborative partnerships intent upon generating youth learning experiences. Various partners include Scouting, 4-H, YMCA, Headstart, Homeschoolers, Center for Independent Living, National Association of Postmasters, National League of Postmasters, American Stamp Dealers Association, National Stamp Dealers Association, Experience Works, Partners in Progress, Senior Citizen Services, Northern Tioga School District, and others who want to see children develop in positive ways.





He an accredited jury chairman for philatelic and literature, AAPE Chairman of the committee to critique title and synopsis pages, and a director of ASDA. His affiliations include the Postal History Society, BNAPS, U.S. Stamp Society, Cape and Natal Study Circle, Philatelic Society of Greater Southern Africa, and the Philatelic Group of Boston.

Stephen Washburne Philadelphia, PA

Stephen a retired Temple University chemistry professor, is an APS and FIP accredited judge specializing in postal history and philately of Portugal and her ex colonies. He also collect Philadelphia and New Jersey postal history, and administers the Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition.

Jeffrey Shapiro Favville, MA

Jeffrey has been a stamp collector since age 8. He is a gold medal exhibitor, philatelic writer, and 26 year member of the American Philatelic Society. For the past 12 years he has as chaired the WSP national Philatelic Show in Boxborough, MA outside of Boston.

Paul was born and raised in Carlisle, England, and is a chemist educated at the University of Liverpool. Until his recent retirement he has spent his entire career as a professor of engineering and is the author of over 400 technical papers. Philatelically, he has specialized in the postal history of GB, USA, Poland and Crotia, and has authored many publications in philatelic journals. His longest most authoritative article have been published in the APC Congress Book (2005 Early PH of Tennessee; 2009 Birth of a new Postal System: the PNA).

### Ann Triggle Clearance, NY

Ann earned a degree in organic chemistry and has worked as a research associate and faculty member in Great Britain and the United States. She founded the Pharmacy Museum at the State University of New York in 1985 and has taught courses in History of Medicine and Science. Her service to the APS has included board and sommittee assignments, judging positions, and awards coordinator for both PACIFIC 97 and Washington 2006. She has been honored as a Fellow of both the Royal Philatelic Society Canada. She has been elected to the FIP Thematic Bureau and to the Society of Postal Historians in the UK. She was the ATA's Distinguished Thematicist of 2006, and she received the APS Luff Award in 2005 for service, to the APS.





# Happy 100th birthday, **Boy Scouts of America**

n 1907, Gen. Robert Baden Powell, a veteran of Britain's Boer War, organized a Scouting program in England when he discovered that many boys were using his military book, "Aids to Scouting," as a guide to outdoor activities.

Baden Powell revised his army Scouting guide into a new program for young boys, then tested his ideas at an island camp.

The camp was so successful that it developed into a youth program, then into the Boy Scout program that quickly spread throughout the British Commonwealth.

William Boyce, a Chicago publisher, incorporated many loosely constructed Scouting groups into a formal organization Feb. 8, 1910. He recruited professionals with experience leading youth organizations. such as the YMCA, to develop a program.

Yet, it was Daniel Beard. Ernest Thompson Seton and James West who developed an organizational structure for the Boy Scouts of America. West was instrumental in securing, in 1916, a congressional charter from the United States Congress. Theodore Roosevelt was a big supporter and used his position as former president to gather support for the organi-

birthday this year. Since that February date in 1910, approximately 100 million boys, men and even women have been members of the Boy Scouts of America. Today, membership is more than 2 million.

The picture that accompanies this week's column is from either 1912 or 1913, proving that this troop from Irondequoit was one of the first in the nation. They are lined up on East Avenue, about where the Little Theater is today, to march in Rochester's Memorial Day parade. As was befitting a farming community, some of the Scouts are mounted on their own horses.

At that time, the Boy Scout movement had not yet designed a standard uniform for all members; consequently, each member in the accompanying photograph seems to have chosen his own style of headgear.

Scouting in Irondequoit today reflects the changes across the nation. There are now between 650 and 700 Boy Scouts in 10 troops and Cub Scouts in
